She began directing choirs in 1989, sharing her love and knowledge of bells with youth and adults. Diane currently directs the Grace Notes at Ascension Lutheran Church, Medford, OR and serves as the Events Coordinator of AREA 10 and served as AREA Chair and Oregon State Chair. Diane also organizes the annual Siskiyou Summit Handbell Conference held in Ashland, OR.

Robin Ethridge has lived in the Pacific Northwest since 2007. She joined Bells of the Sound in Seattle in 2010 and has loved ringing around the world at various advanced ringing events since – Distinctly Bronze West, Virtuoso, Area 10 All Star Choir, 2 International Symposia. She also enjoys playing auxiliary percussion any chance she can get.

Shelley Giaier has been ringing and directing church and community handbell choirs for almost 40 years in Michigan, Iowa, New Jersey and now in Oregon. Currently, she directs the *Bells of Sunriver* (Sunriver Christian Fellowship, Sunriver, Oregon) and the *Bells of Praise* at Bend United Methodist Church in Bend, Oregon. She is the current Chair of Area 10.

Diane served as MT state chair for several years before moving through the ranks and serving as Area 10 chair. After a hiatus, she has returned to the Area board and is serving as Membership Chair. Diane holds a degree in vocal education from Montana State University. She has sung for over 10 years with the Great Falls Symphonic Choir and is an active vocal soloist in her community. She has served as a co-director of the youth performing group Strings n Things and is passionate about giving youth the lifelong skills gained through performing.

She was immediately introduced to how high the bar can be! She readily admits she's not there yet, but she continues to work to improve. She obtained a one-year loan of 3-octaves of chimes from Area 10 to explore the ability of a small community to support a choir. After a successful first season, she purchased a 3-octave set of Malmark bells and obtained a community grant to purchase Malmark chimes. Fast forward 11 years and the Seeley-Swan Mountain Bells now ring 4.5 octaves of bells, along with the chimes. Best laid plans... because she was forced to direct the local choir, she travels 110 miles round trip each week to ring with a choir in the nearest "big city". Joann has dipped her toe into the solo ringing waters and has also taken up belltree ringing during COVID isolation. She currently serves as the Communications Chair for Area 10.
